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
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Vision

Mayors Forward



Over a month ago, I presented the State of the Municipality Address to the communities of Senqu LM from different corners of this jurisdiction and on different platforms.

In section 25 of the Local Government Municipal Systems Act, 2000 (Act32 of 2000) each municipal council must, after the start of its elected term, adopt a single, inclusive and strategic plan (IDP) for the development of the municipality which links, integrates and coordinates plans, takes into account proposals for the development of the municipality which aligns the resources and capacity of the municipality with the implementation of the said plan.

Therefore, the State of the Municipality Address I presented was informed by the objectives and priorities as set out in the IDP, which specifically addressed the ability to provide a budget that is strategically and financially credible.

As part of the address, we have also included projects from sector departments with the aim of improving the coherence and impact of government service delivery.

Our capital budget totals R73,29 million for the 2022/23 budget year from which a total of 48,23 per cent, or R35,35 million of the capital budget, is funded from our own cash-backed Capital Replacement Reserve (or CRR). This is a big deal, especially during these times where most

municipalities in the Eastern Cape - let alone in the country - received a negative audit outcome. The municipality's good governance and good financial planning has resulted in the Senqu Municipality's being placed in the top 5 according to the Afrika Ratings.

Among the good stories that we can tell about Senqu, there is also a big predicament which has affected not only the country, but also our area. Gender Based Violence and the hikein car theft, more especially in Sterkspruit, is a big concern.

I plea with the communities to view fighting gender based violence as everyone's business and to be cautious of their surroundings, avoid driving late at night/early hours of the morning when roads are quiet. If possible, never drive alone and DO NOT pick up hitchhikers.

Lastly, remember wearing of masks no longer a requirement as it said by the Department of Health.

Eastern Cape Province launches Rhodes Snow Festival to welcome winter season

The Eastern Cape Parks and Tourism Agency (ECPTA), in partnership with the Joe-Gqabi local Municipality and Senqu local municipality, officially launched the Snow Festival in the quaint little town of Rhodes as part of welcoming the winter season in the province.

Winter in the Eastern Cape is filled with festivals, from the Kirkwood Festival, National Arts Festival and the Snow Festival, and this year all three festivals took place simultaneously.

The launch of the Snow Festival focused on the introduction of volunteer tourism and exposing the hidden gems of the highland region and festivities of the snow festival, following the announcement of the complete lifting of restrictions in the country. Some of the activities on the itinerary also included food and wine pairing at the Silkbush Estate and welcoming Spanish students for the Volunteer Tourism Programme.

Chairperson of the ECPTA board, Tracy Putzier, said that this first-of-a-kind event has potential to become much more than just a festival, but a community-driven and owned project which creates sustainable jobs and provides business opportunities in the Highlands region.

"We at ECPTA are proud to be associated with all provincial signature and small-scale events that help us to create jobs and grow the provincial GDP. We understand that events play a critical role in provincial tourism because they act as draw cards to the province," said Ms Putzier.

Putzier further said that events are visitor number drivers and that they play a crucial role in providing a tangible reason for people to visit the province.

"Events are triggers for diversified tourism offerings and are also catalysts for economic growth and job creation. They have the potential to deliver outstanding return on investment and, therefore, there is considerable value in hosting them in our province," Putzier said.

Putzier called for the promotion and action of exceptional customer care service when dealing with tourists in order for their experiences to prompt them into more return visits.

"When tourists visit our shores, all they want is to explore our beautiful province. They want to feel welcomed and they want to feel safe; we must work together to ensure that they are safe. Communities need to help us rid our province of criminal elements that render our province unsafe," said Putzier.

"We should all be proud of our natural and authentic experiences from culture, heritage, 800kms of coastline, adventure, wildlife, and our signature events as they make us unique."

According to Putzier, the Eastern Cape is a destination for all seasons as she further invited visitors to explore the winter season in style.

Iln an effort to strengthen Inter-governmental relations, the Eastern Cape Department of Rural Development and Agrarian Reform along with Senqu LM handed over a fully-fledged multipurpose shearing shed in Ward 12 Sterkspruit.

The wool producers were also furnished with equipment such as a wool compressor as it will assist with the resilience of the wool, the baler machine for compressing wool that are easy to handle, shearers and trolleys. This equipment will enhance farmers' productivity.

Senqu Wool Growers are known as one of the best wool producers in the Eastern Cape. Despite not having formal facilities, in 2017 farmers produced wool worth R342 000. In 2018, they produced more than R429 000;201 000 in 2019, while in 2020 they earned R446 000 and for 2021 the wool production are yet to be announced.

"The shortage of jobs in South Africa requires our youth to be innovative and flexible in order to sustain themselves. I therefore encourage Senqu youth to look into wool production as it is evident that Senqu region is doing well in that regard," says Senqu Mayor, Cllr V Stokhwe.

Mr Nqgola from land reform mentioned that there are various farmer support initiatives that are available through government and encouraged

the farmers to take advantage of these farmer support programmes offered by government and not to stop visiting their local offices for any clarification or support.

Infrastructure Development within Senqu Local Municipality - Road Maintenance Programme

Senqu Local Municipality (SLM) is performing the different Municipal Services that are based on the Devolution of Powers and Functions as contained in Municipal Structures Act, Act 117 of 1998.

One of the objects of Local Government is to: "ensure that the provision of services to communities is done in a sustainable manner."

This object is very critical as it seeks to achieve a balance between implementing capital projects whilst, at the same time, ensuring that the existing infrastructure is taken care of in a form of maintenance as failure to do so will lead to its deterioration, as is the case now. Hence, this article is aimed at elaborating on the latter.

Most Municipalities tend to focus on the development of new infrastructure and less attention is given to the existing ones. This approach ends up causing a lot of strain on the existing infrastructure as inadequate maintenance results in its being in a bad state.

Road and stormwater infrastructure is one of the key performance indicators that falls within the devolutions of powers and functions of Senqu Local Municipality. It is an indicator that plays a pivotal role in Local Economic Development as a Municipality whose roads and stormwater infrastructure services are in a good state will attract various forms of investment opportunities. As much as the development of roads and stormwater infrastructure is important, so is the maintenance of the existing one and more emphasis should be given to the latter.

It is, therefore, on this basis that the Municipality has prioritised the maintenance of Roads and Stormwater infrastructure. An ideal scenario is that the road design whose lifespan is fifteen years, should see maintenance activities kick in at around two-thirds of its lifespan, which in this instance is at ten years. Maintenance activities can be done in different forms depending on the availability of the financial resources. These range from:

Potholes patching - this approach is most suitable when the road surface is damaged; however, there should be no structural damage to the portion that is to be patched.

Potholes patching and sealing – this approach is most suitable when the road surface is damaged and there are crocodile cracks. Sealing can be done through slurry or single or double-layer aggregates.

Structural layers correction and sealing – this approach is most suitable where structural layers are damaged.

It has become evident based on the previous maintenance that the Municipality did, that this was not sustainable as the approach of road maintenance was unfortunately a one size-fits-all approach. The other main factor that was against the Municipality was the type of material that was used for road patching as during inclement weather, especially in winter, it had to be pre-heated and this is taking a very long time and, in some instances, it was not durable.

The Municipality, therefore initiated an approach of coming up with a diversified and customized approach that will consider the type of defects envisaged in the road infrastructure under consideration. To this end, an initiative of road maintenance through pure Labor-Based Surfacing training was introduced where theoretical and onsite accredited training was conducted for a total of thirty-two beneficiaries (a combination of permanent Municipality employees and Expanded Public Works Programme beneficiaries. This training was for a period of twelve weeks.

The Municipality is therefore manufacturing the road maintenance material from raw materials that are mixed with customised binders. The manufactured product is used in both warm and cold weather and does not require pre-heating. This maintenance approach is more sustainable based on the methodology employed and the material is very durable, thus easy to use. The most important factor is the cost component as the normal cold premix bag cost around R 130 per 30 kg bag. The Municipality, through this initiative, will save about fifty percent of the cost.

Onsite training was conducted at Mokhesi village access road as its state was bad. Based on the work already done, it is evident that the maintenance done has brought about a significant improvement and the road users are commending this initiative.

MONKEYPOX

WHAT IS MONKEYPOX?

It is a rare disease transmitted to humans from infected animals such rodents, and monkeys. Once a person is infected by an animal, person-to-person transmission may then occur.

MONKEYPOX IS TRANSMITTED THROUGH:

- Physical contact with bodily fluid of infected persons
- Contact with materials used by infected persons (bed sheets, towels etc), and surfaces that have been used by a person with monkeypox
- Respiratory droplets or oral fluids (e.g., fluid that comes out of the mouth and nose during breathing, talking, sneezing, and coughing) or fluids during sexual intercourse.

TREATMENT

There is no treatment for Monkeypox and most people recover within a few weeks after being infected. Stay at home (isolate) and avoid close contact with other people for a period of 21 days or until fully recovered.

HOW TO PREVENT GETTING MONKEYPOX

- Wash hands with soap and water frequently or an alcohol-based hand rub
- Clean and disinfect any contaminated surfaces
- Avoid contact with contaminated materials of an infected person (ie: bedding)
- Wear a mask when handling any clothes or bedding of an infected person
- If contaminated materials need to be cleaned, wash them with warm water and detergent.

IF YOU HAVE A NEW OR UNEXPLAINED RASH, SORES, OR OTHER SYMPTOMS VISIT YOUR NEAREST CLINIC OR COMMUNITY HEALTHCARE CENTRE TO SEEK FOR IMMEDIATE MEDICAL ATTENTION.

It is important to diagnose Monkeypox on time to aid in the efforts to contain the transmission of the virus and avoid more cases from occurring.
